New TDC Cat Regulations

As of 1 January 2025, Tasman District Council's new Cat Management Bylaw is in effect. This means: - All domestic cats need to be microchipped, registered on the New Zealand Companion Animal Register (NZCAR) and desexed by the time they are six months old.

- Cats can be exempt from desexing if they are a breeding cat registered with a national breeding body, or if a vet considers the procedure could harm the health or welfare of the cat (this would be extremely uncommon eg a cat with heart disease so anaesthetic is risky)

- Owners of older cats have until June 2026 to comply with the bylaw.

- If you have a cat that is already desexed, microchipped and registered on NZCAR, you don't have to do anything else.

And remember:

Being microchipped doesn't automatically register your cat on NZCAR. If you're not sure if your cat is registered, you can check directly on NZCAR's website by entering your cat's microchip number.
If you don't know if your cat is microchipped or its number, you might be able to find it in vaccination records, vet paperwork or by phoning your vet or bringing your cat in to be scanned.

These measures have been put in place to support cat welfare. Managing our pet cat population will enable us to better manage the feral and stray cat populations that live completely different lives to our pet cats. Until now there have been no rules and cat populations are out of control which is not good for cats or our environment.

A microchipped lost cat can easily and quickly be reunited with its family while an unmicrochipped lost cat is just another unidentifiable cat that ends up at a rescue centre or vet clinic and is rehomed or euthanased. Getting home quickly reduces stress for the cat as well as its owner. A desexed cat cannot breed which means fewer unwanted and unexpected kittens, fewer stray cats and fewer cats ending up in rescue centres. Desexed cats are less likely to roam, get injured on the road and get into fights.

In the next few years, TDC is also going to look into further cat management regulations such as limits on pet cat numbers, curfews and feeding cat colonies.

· Planning ahead and booking for one of the eBus journeys with Age Concern staff and volunteer Bus Buddies

These sessions are being held in many locations throughout the region between December 2024 to June 2025.

In Wakefield, there will be an Information Session in the village community library on Wednesday 12th March, between 10am and 12pm. There's no need to register, just pop in any time during the session.

The second element of the initiative is guided eBus journeys that will have Age Concern staff and volunteer Bus Buddies on board to help.

These bus journeys are on many different routes, and on Thursday 27th March, there's a planned journey between Wakefield and Nelson.

Waimea South Historical Society

For the last meeting of the year, an enjoyable Christmas gathering was held at Willow Bank on 26th December. At first a general meeting was held followed a 'pot luck' lunch. As per usual, Christine Grieder had the premises beautifully presented which made it a very pleasant venue.

Once lunch was over, Yo Tye presented an interesting story about Samuel Fittall (1837-1917). He had first come to our notice when his signature, dated 1867, was found in an old Bible in the possession of Dorothy Hole.

Dorothy had been a leader at Every Girls Rally, a Church based activity which took place in the old Brethren Gospel Hall in Pitfure Road.

Research undertaken for the recent 'Ecclesiastical Historic Walk' revealed that Samuel Fittall had been the Chairman of the Building Committee to have this Gospel Hall built in 1865.

Although he lived in Richmond where he had a paint shop on the corner of Queen St and Salisbury Road, he had married Ellen Marie Hooper of Wakefield. Ellen was the eldest daughter of Edwin and Eliza Hooper who were the proprietors of Hooper's Store on the corner of Pigeon Valley Road and Whitby Road in Wakefield.

One of Samuel and Ellen's granddaughters, Helen McRae-Fittall, taught at Wakefield and 88 Valley Schools in the 1920's. Samuel had been a prominent leader in Local Body affairs. He was instrumental in having Richmond declared a Borough and served as Richmond Town Clerk for 26 years. He was also Overseer of Richmond Council Roads Board.

Samuel and Ellen, who died in 1917 and 1925 respectively, are buried together in the Richmond Cemetery on Wensley Road. As a follow on, It has been a privilege to inform Dorothy Hole something about the mysterious signature in the old Bible.




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In the Bush

Take three-quarters of a pound of flour, two ounces of Berwick's baking powder, two ounces of bread crumbs, one and a-half pounds of suet, two pounds of raisins, one pound of currants, ten ounces of sugar, two ounces of almonds, one pound of mixed candied, peel; 'salt and spice to taste; mix the ingredients well together, and add six eggs, well beaten, and three-quarters of a pint of milk; divide in two, and boil eight hours.
